Of the 26, 940 fraternities and sororities in the United States nine (9) are comprised primarily of members of African descent. I represent one of 9 Black Greek lettered Organizations based here in the United States of America. But I hasten to add, while these members are predominantly American, they are from nations around the world.

Their total assets, based on present data = \$228,104,768, a quarter of a billion dollars or more. Caveats – these data are reported as of 3/30/2025 on one singular website for reporting year 2023

This group of individuals represent the intellectual elite, businessmen, clergy, educators, medical professionals, lawyers, judges, entrepreneurs' - predominantly the professional community – community of scholars and doers. In short this group represent wealth (actual as well as access to wealth).

Where are we?

We are all over the place. We are in our public schools, our colleges, and universities – public, private, independent, and parochial. We are in our churches and other places of worship. We are in our private businesses, corporate businesses, hospitals medical establishments, transportation, local, state national government and jails and prisons.
